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Kia ora koutou e ngā taura, ngā pouako, ngā kaiarahi katoa, tena koutou katoa. Greetings to you all. This issue features a summary of Ngā Hui Heke - Regions 1 and 3 and then looks at various ways to use technology to reach learners (virtually) face-to-face; encourages 'silver surfers' step by step to have a go with computers and the internet, and provides links to access inspiring, motivating, persuasive and educational presentations, home grown and international.

Ngā Hui Heke Tuatahi and Tuatoru – Regional Hui

Te Hui Heke Tuatoru (Region 3) was hosted by **Buller Adult Learning in Westport** in April. The National Office programme filled Day One (see previous issue of *Tui Tuia*) as well as the election for the Te Heke 3 Māori representative for Te Kōruru, with Margaret Manuel (Literacy Westland) being re-elected. The day concluded with an exquisite West Coast meal at the 'world famous on the coast' Bay House Café situated on Tauranga Bay, where hui whānau were treated to a sumptuous banquet meal and a view of the moon.

Day Two workshops in Te Heke 3 included a round-table discussion for each Poupou to share creative solutions for designing the ILN (Intensive Literacy & Numeracy) Programme. Cameron Forbes (Manager ALS Nelson) and Barbara Duckett (Literacy Westland) gave a brief presentation on designing a website. Meanwhile other participants learnt more about the 'TADA' Database. The feedback to Buller Manager Jeanette, since the hui has been positive, particularly with reference to wild pork, whitebait and venison.

Te Hui Heke Tuatahi (Region 1) was hosted by **Waitakere Adult Literacy inc. (WALI) in Henderson**, West Auckland in May. The National Office programme ran with the added bonus of guest speaker Brendon (Te Tiwha) Puketapu from TEC, who spoke to hui whānau about his role as the Director of Māori Strategy for TEC and explained the structure of TEC from Ministry level to providers. The Te Kōruru election for the Te Heke 1 Taiwi representative resulted in a tie between Gaye Anstis (Literacy Aotearoa Hauraki) & Fran Lapsley (Waiheke Adult Literacy).* In the evening, hui whānau were treated to a dinner at The Falls Restaurant (built in 1854), world famous in Waitakere.

Day Two included five workshops delivered by WALI staff: Janet Fournier shared some numeracy strategies using readily available resources such as fingers, dice and cards; Anne Chen led an action-packed session with ideas for making grammar, pronunciation and conversation accessible to lower level learners using words, actions and music. Belinda Jane Greenslade shared some ideas about how to get the most out of the 'TADA' database and meet deadlines, while Tooki Proctor introduced the 'E-beam Interactive whiteboard', a fascinating new learning tool. Miriam James-Scotter facilitated a discussion on workplace management and tutoring discoveries, challenges and tools. (See photos on page 2)



Parlance, newsletter April 2010 - Tutor Talk from Andries van der Sluis:

I work with a group in Kawakawa called “He Parirau Roha” which means spread wings.



Due to funding cuts by the Tertiary Education Commission, I decided to explore the option of teaching my group in Kawakawa while remaining in Whangarei!

I have achieved this with a programme called *LogMeIn*, an internet-based computer remote control program. I also run *Windows Live Messenger* which enables me to see and hear the group as I help them develop their literacy skills. When I am remotely controlling, students can ask me questions and I can demonstrate things via my computer in Whangarei.

Even though it is early days, I have been getting positive feedback from the students who can take control of the computer themselves and I can see in real time what they are doing. The students feel they are learning independently and I am still there to help when they get stuck. They have said that it encourages them to think more for themselves, as I am not physically available at their computer to help them.

I also tried the program *Teamviewer* which had a bit too much lag time for my liking. These methods of long-distance teaching and learning will be great tools for the future, combined with the benefit of avoiding the time and cost of travel - one student pointed out that it lowered my environmental impact!

As computer skills are becoming an increasingly important part of general Literacy demand, these developments will enable us to provide help in both these areas, ‘killing two birds with one stone’!

I am also teaching apprentices, helping them with their various course work requirements, and am involved with individuals and small groups assisting them in situ with the demands of their workplace. This work is quite often maths- orientated, e.g. trigonometry or maths for engineering. I work with bricklayers, builders, mechanics, engineering apprentices and trainee electricians. My job is a challenge but also a real pleasure. Please feel free to contact me if you have any questions.
